Implementation Update: ♦ Successes ♦ Barriers ♦ # of Referrals ♦ Other data?	Individual and Family Support Network, formerly Interfaith Support Network, reports 17 new referrals in the 12 th quarter. Engaged 10 new clients and they have 20 active clients carried over from previous quarters. They have an active caseload of 39 clients. The target for the Jail In-Reach program is 40. Clients participated in the following services: 1 entered detox 3 entered inpatient substance use treatment 5 entered outpatient substance use treatments 4 received employment services 1 received family reunification services 13 received housing services through COTS, Arrowood, or BHPH program, sober living environment or	

permanent housing.
8 received additional social services
to receive educational services
6 clients received food assistance
8 received basic necessities
6 access health services like medical,
dental, emergency support services.
33 received case management
services
22 re-entry
25 received some sort of
transportation assistance
Whole Person Care made 11 referrals

Highlights: Having two full time case managers. Referrals continue to come in regularly and many collaborative relationships have been formed. We're able to provide some support to clients getting access to employment services and getting connected to the JC for the first time. The relationship and rapport building that is done with clients in custody and out is proving to make such a difference in clients developing an openness to getting some help in having their needs met.

Carrie from RDA reports there are two deliverables left. They'll be doing another infographic like they did for year one which will be available early 2026. The last deliverable is the required local evaluation report, a BSCC requirement for Prop 47 funding.

They're planning 3 or 4 focus groups in the fall in order to collect qualitative data before services end. On August 14th, there will be a meeting with IFSN, David and his team, a representative from the Sheriff's Department, and a couple of other key providers to have a detailed discussion about how we're doing and plan for any upcoming activities. They'll be talking through who they want to be in those focus groups. Clients, a selected provider

Exact details to be determined in August.</p> <p>Qualitative data that is collected by that group as well as hard data that IFSN and Behavioral Health has been tracking since the beginning of the project will be formed into the local evaluation report to fulfill requirements set by BSCC for that report. Once the report template is completed, it'll be analyzed, the data will be vetted with the committee, a report drafted, the draft will be shared for feedback. They'll make sure everything is accurate before they finalize that report and turn it into the BSCC in June of 2026.</p>

Community Q&A	<p>Q: Is there a detail of what reentry services are specifically?</p> <p>A: Re-entry services are those activities that help incarcerated individuals re-adjust to society upon release. There may be additional activities that IFSN performs under the category of case management services, the additional activities that their team performs outside of helping link individuals to a number of entitlement services. Food assistance, basic necessities, health services (medical, dental, emergency support services), case management, transportation, housing, vocational and job training.</p> <p>Q: “As far as the evaluation report, once that's prepared and shared out to the community, are there other governing bodies that will be looking at that is there an evaluation of outcomes and further discussion compared to other Prop 47 programs</p>	

across the state in order to see what were best practices [and] what can be capitalized on by others?

A: Our report will focus just on Sonoma County. It's required to be turned in to the Board of State and Community Corrections, the funder for Prop 47, and they do have some statewide evaluation that happens as well for all Prop 47 funded programs, but it varies by year. There are different Cohorts of Prop 47 funding, and this project is associated with Cohort 3 funding. Quarterly, David and his team have to submit quarterly reports to the BSCC on certain metrics. All of those metrics are the same across all of the counties, and then they take a look at statewide, how many people are being served and what services are being provided. BSCC seems to wait until the end of a Cohort before releasing findings. There was a large state report that came out not long ago that focused on realignment generally and some of the initiatives under realignment, including Prop 47, that show really positive results. It shows how the state has approached realignment and how beneficial it has been as far as recidivism metrics and other successful outcomes such as state cost savings for the count and the state along with other metrics.

Q: Is that a conglomerate report of all previous cohorts? Where does that report come from?

A: It was a statewide report that came from Board of State and Community Corrections that looked at the whole landscape about realignment generally.

Q: Do you know if there are reports from the first two cohorts individually that are accessible, and if so, how can I get those, please?

A: Yes, I'll link the BSCC Prop 47 web page in the chat.
